What to Know About This Year's Flu Season

In the United States, influenza (flu) season lasts from October through May, with peak flu activity between December and March.

What's more, flu season in the Southern Hemisphere often indicates what's to come in the United States. Data revealed that the 2024 flu season in the Southern Hemisphere was similar to previous flu seasons. With the potential for this year's flu season to be severe in the United States, vaccination remains the most effective way to prevent the flu, especially severe disease and hospitalization.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that the flu caused between **9 million** and **41 million illnesses** annually between 2010 and 2023.



How to Stay Healthy

The flu can cause serious complications for people of any age, but children and older adults are especially vulnerable. To help keep your household healthy this flu season, consider these tips:

• Get the flu vaccine. Being vaccinated against the flu is your best chance of preventing the illness.

- The CDC recommends that anyone aged 6 months and older get a flu shot every year.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick and stay away from others when you feel unwell. Since flu, cold, and COVID-19 symptoms are similar, doctors suggest testing to know what you have.
- Wash your hands often using soap and warm water to protect against germs. If soap and water are unavailable, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Cover your mouth and nose. Cough or sneeze into a tissue or elbow. Dispose of tissues immediately.
- Get seven to nine hours of quality sleep each night.
- Exercise regularly to strengthen your body and build resiliency against infections like the flu.
- Stay hydrated. Eat a nutritious diet rich in whole grains, lean proteins, fruits, vegetables, and fiber.

- 1 small yellow onion (chopped)
- 1 green bell pepper (chopped)

Preparations


- 1. Heat the oil in a large pot over medium-high heat.
- 2. Add the onion, bell pepper, jalapenos, and garlic and cook, stirring frequently, until tender.
- 3. Add the turkey and cook until browned.
- 4. Add tomatoes, pumpkin, water, chili powder, cumin, salt, and black pepper; bring to a boil.
- 5. Reduce the heat to medium-low, then add the beans.
- 6. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Flu shots and vaccines may not be available in all pharmacies at all times. Call for availability and to make an appointment, if needed. Most vaccines require a prescription (except for the flu shot). The flu shot and many vaccines to treat common illnesses are generally covered under the Affordable Care Act by non-grandfathered group health plans and non-grandfathered individual and group health insurance coverage typically with no cost sharing if provided by an in-network provider, consistent with specified dosage limits and satisfaction of age and other vaccine specific requirements. Other restrictions may apply. Check with your health plan if you have any questions about your benefits.



Premium Assistance Under Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

If you or your children are eligible for Medicaid or CHIP and you're eligible for health coverage from your employer, your state may have a premium assistance program that can help pay for coverage, using funds from their Medicaid or CHIP programs. If you or your children aren't eligible for Medicaid or CHIP, you won't be eligible for these premium assistance programs but you may be able to buy individual insurance coverage through the Health Insurance Marketplace. For more information, visit www.healthcare.gov.

If you or your dependents are already enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP and you live in a State listed below, contact your State Medicaid or CHIP office to find out if premium assistance is available.

If you or your dependents are NOT currently enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP, and you think you or any of your dependents might be eligible for either of these programs, contact your State Medicaid or CHIP office or dial 1-877-KIDS NOW or www.insurekidsnow.gov to find out how to apply. If you qualify, ask your state if it has a program that might help you pay the premiums for an employer-sponsored plan.

If you or your dependents are eligible for premium assistance under Medicaid or CHIP, as well as eligible under your employer plan, your employer must allow you to enroll in your employer plan if you aren't already enrolled. This is called a "special enrollment" opportunity, and **you must request coverage within 60 days of being determined eligible for premium assistance**.
